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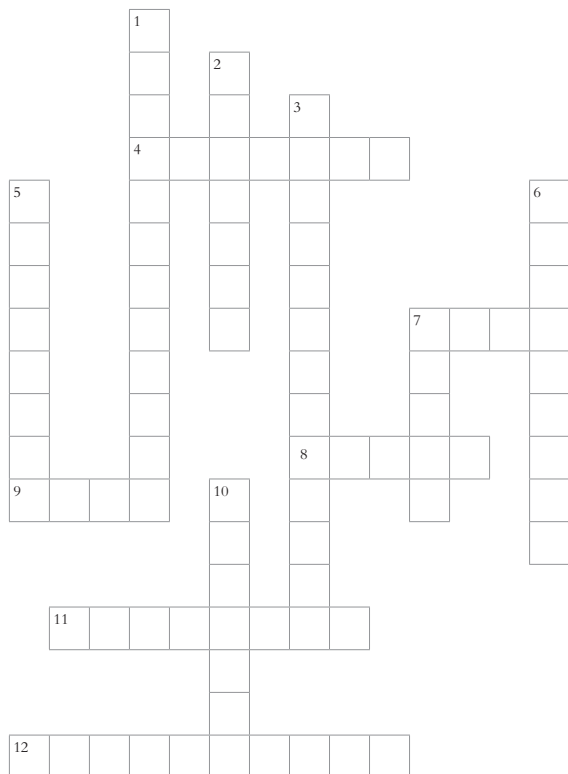

Miss Marple's mistake: The family was poisoned with arsenic put in the cocktails, not the curry. Dr Quimper put the arsenic in the curry which was left, **after** the family had eaten, because it was going to be analyzed.
